Hopefully the Planning Representatives shared with their departments the passion and concern we have for our community.

We welcome our new neighbors and invite you to come and get involved. We want your ideas, your skills and resources to help us to maintain a great quality of life in our community.

Remembering Rob and Elise Sandiford

Our hearts are saddened about the tragic accident that claimed the lives of two of our beloved neighbors, Rob and Elise Sandiford of Stearns Drive.

Theirs was a beautiful love story, beginning in Colorado where Elise attended college, graduate school, and then taught Special Education. They married in 1979, and moved to L.A. for Rob's music. Rob had a wonderful career at Los Angeles City Hall, while Elise taught in Special Education and Juvenile Court Schools.

With the expansion of their family, Elise chose full-time parenting, caring for their daughter Kira and son Devon. She was an active volunteer at the Los Angeles Community Magnet school and the Los Angeles Center for Enriched Studies for many years.

When he had time away from his "day job", Rob was a musician and songwriter. He and such bands as *Scramble* and *Homemade Jam* played at festivals, open mike nights and many other events. Rob also played his guitar and sang at Neighbors United block parties and holiday parties over the years.

Finally retirement came and Rob and Elise headed off in their new RV to the Strawberry Music Festival where they looked forward to Rob's performing and seeing their friends. Now, they are together forever, resting in peace.

We extend our deepest condolences to Kira and Devon and their extended family and friends. They will be truly missed in our community. A memorial service will be scheduled in the future. We will share the information as soon as we hear.

Your Neighbors Are Pretty Angry



If you are the one(s) who walk(s) your dog off-leash and/or do not carry bags to clean up your dog's business, your neighbors are pretty angry. Most of our neighbors are very thoughtful and responsible. They always pick up their doggy droppings and dispose of them. However there are a few less considerate dog walkers who do not.

A September 2014 article in the Los Angeles Times reported that the Los Angeles City Council adopted a new system that allows police officers to issue citations for minor "quality of life" crimes that would typically be resolved with a warning. The pilot program, called Administrative Citation Enforcement, gives the Los Angeles Police Department and the Department of Animal Services a new enforcement tool that bypasses the court system. It allows city officials to impose fines for offenses such as having dogs off leashes, dumping garbage in public streets, or urinating in public.

Currently, officers can either give a warning, or launch a criminal misdemeanor case against people who commit these infractions. Under the program, fines for animal-related offenses begin at \$100, and then increase to \$250 and then \$500. Most first offenses of other infractions would be \$250, the second \$500 and the third \$1,000. In each incident, officers can still decide whether to issue a warning, a financial penalty or a criminal case.

Another problem reported to us is dogs running loose and attacking neighbors' leashed dogs as they walk. Some neighbors have had to pay expensive veterinarian bills for injuries to their dogs.

Dedicated block captains George and Theodora can no longer serve as block captains for the 1600 block of Point View. We greatly appreciate their dedication and hard work over the years.

So what is required, you ask?

- **Recording Secretary:** Record minutes of board meetings and general meetings of association; read minutes at meetings as appropriate; maintain records, including constitution, bylaws, minutes of all meetings, job descriptions for all officers. Will keep a record of all names and addresses of association members. Other duties incident of the Recording Secretary as may be given by the President.
- **Hearts and Flowers Chair:** Sends get-well, thinking of you and condolence cards to NU members when we have been notified of an illness or death. In addition delivers flowers or plants to neighbors who have been hospitalized or had a death in the immediate family
- **Block Captains** distribute monthly newsletters to neighbors on their block and inform the NU board of issues of interest or concern on the block. While we do send newsletters electronically to some neighbors, everyone does not have email and not everyone shares their email addresses. Therefore, we still deliver hard copies to make certain that our neighbors are informed about Faircrest Heights issues.

We hope others will kindly step up and help. Block captains are also needed for the 1500, 1600 and 1800 blocks of Fairfax (west side).
