Hello Neighbors,

Last month we took a break – no meeting and no newsletters. We're back!

Please make plans to attend our next meeting to hear about upcoming housing development plans in Faircrest Heights. Raffi Cohen of Galaxy Commercial Holdings will be our guest. Mr. Cohen plans to build 16 single-family homes on a new small lot subdivision project at Hi Point and Pickford. Be sure to come and get answers to your questions and concerns.

You may recall our discussion of Jerry's Garden, the 31-room hotel in the 6000 block of Pico that had only 8 guest rooms with bathrooms and the remaining rooms had communal facilities. After operating for at least 10 years without proper permits, Jerry's Garden applied for a permit to continue its operations with certain improvements. Neighbors United, CHAPS, South Carthay and Carthay Square Associations, as well as PICO NC opposed the application and the Los Angeles Planning Department denied the application.

There is an appeals hearing before the L. A. Planning Commission on Tuesday, September 9, 2014 at 4:30 p.m. at City Hall. Curious About the Surveyors in the Area?



This is the La Cienega Interceptor Sewer project. According to the Los Angeles Department of Public Works, this project will rehabilitate 10,882 linear feet (2.1 miles) of the La Cienega Interceptor Sewer (LCIS) constructed in the 1920s, from La Cienega Boulevard and Fairfax Avenue (north of the Blackwelder Diversion Structure) to Schumacher Drive (north of Olympic Boulevard). The project will rehabilitate approximately, 3,462 linear feet (LF) of 39-inch semielliptical concrete sewers, 4,390 LF of 42-inch semi-elliptical tile lined concrete sewers, 2,660 LF of 63-inch semi-elliptical concrete sewers, 190 LF of 33-inch double barrel circular VCP siphon, and 180 LF of 45-inch circular concrete siphon. The project will also construct or remove/replace existing MHs, siphon structures. In addition, this project will construct approximately 2,800 lf of 8" VCP local sewer and 19 MHs to intercept the existing 48 active house connections (HCs). For our immediate area, construction will be between the La Cienega/Olympic intersection and the 10 freeway.

Here's the good news: This project will be completed mostly underground. Above ground construction will be mostly at tie-ins or intersections. Construction is scheduled to begin in 2017 and last for a year and a half. There will be a series of community meetings and affected areas will be notified by mail prior to construction.

The Changing of a Great Neighborhood

Many neighbors have expressed concerns about new development projects in the Faircrest Heights Community. We hear of sky-high offers to purchase homes and sometimes intimidation about what is coming if you don't sell your home. Selling your home is a highly personal decision. Not a decision to be made in fear. Most homes in R-2 and R-3 zones will be replaced by apartment complexes or small lot subdivisions due to the deep lot sizes.

Developers can build up to 22 apartments in place of 2 single-family houses in these zones. They can build up to 29 units with a higher height with incentives to provide several low income units. There is such an application pending on the 1400 block of Point View. These will be rental properties.

Developers can build as many as 5 to 8 single-family homes in place of one single family home in these zones. The homes are typically up to 3 stories tall with parking garages for 2 cars. These are normally privately owned and not rented.

Normally in the R-1 zones, only one single-family home is permitted. However, several years ago, an ordinance permitted homeowners to build a "mother-in-law apartment" or "granny flat" on the same property under certain conditions.

We love Faircrest Heights and our neighbors. We look forward to maintaining its beautiful character and sense of community.
